

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
















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

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

LAUREN GUNDERSON has been one of the most produced playwrights in America since 2015, topping the list thrice including 2022/23. She is a two-time winner of the Steinberg/ ATCA New Play Award for I and You and The Book of Will, the winner of the William Inge Distinguished Achievement in Theatre Award, the Lanford Wilson Award and a finalist for the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize. Notable plays include: Ada and the Engine, The Book of Will, The Catastrophist, I and You, Peter Pan and Wendy, The Revolutionists, Silent Sky, and the Christmas at Pemberley trilogy (with Margot Melcon). She is a playwright, screenwriter, musical book writer and children's author who lives in San Francisco. She graduated from NYU Tisch as a Reynolds Fellow in Social Entrepreneurship.



Notes from the Director



Welcome to The Half-Life of Marie Curie, an imaginative exploration of the profound friendship between Marie Curie and Hertha Ayrton, two pioneering female scientists who navigated male-dominated scientific fields to leave their mark on history. Their friendship was a source of emotional and intellectual support, providing strength amidst the challenges they faced as women navigating the turn of the 20th century. While Marie Curie is a well-known figure, it is through her enduring friendship with (perhaps lesser-known) Hertha Aryton that playwright Lauren Gunderson perfectly captures a slice of Curie's life—inviting us to further explore her life and legacy.

Though Half-Life takes place primarily during the summer of 1912, I'm struck by the relevance of this story in 2025. The unfair treatment which

Marie and Hertha encountered through scandal, politics, marginalization, and near erasure of their scientific contributions are reflected in the experiences of many women. Although much progress has been made, the sexism and misogyny faced by these characters are echoed still today: only three percent of Nobel Prizes in the sciences have ever been awarded to women, Marie Curie remains the only woman to have won two Nobel Prizes, and women remain underrepresented in STEM fields (science, technology, engineering and math).

Half-Life is a testament to the importance of female friendship as both a source of strength and a form of resistance. As we engage in the histories of Marie and Hertha, we are given an opportunity to acknowledge how far we've come scientifically, and how much further we still need to go toward creating spaces where women, and all people, can be fully recognized and supported equally in their pursuits.

A play about brilliance, courage, and legacy, The Half-Life of Marie Curie honors the fragility of the human condition while celebrating the unbreakable bond of two extraordinary scientists.

MARIE CURIE

Marie Curie (born Maria Salomea Sklodowska on November 7, 1867, in Warsaw) was a physicist and chemist who pioneered research

in radioactivity. Despite excelling in her studies, familial financial struggles forced her to work as a teacher and governess. In

1891, she moved to Paris to study at the Sorbonne, earning degrees in physics (1893) and mathematics (1894). She met Pierre Curie that same year, and although she initially declined his proposal to return to Poland, she later realized she could not pursue her field due to academic sexism. She returned to Paris, married Pierre in 1895, and pursued a PhD.

Fascinated by uranium's radiation, Marie and Pierre discovered polonium and radium in 1898. Between 1898 and 1902, they published 32 papers, including one showing radium's ability to destroy tumor cells. In 1903, Marie became the first woman to win a Nobel Prize in Physics, shared with

Pierre and Henri Becquerel.

After Pierre's death in 1906, she became the first female professor at the University of Paris. In 1910, she helped define the unit of radioactivity, the "curie." Despite her achievements, she faced xenophobia and scandal over an affair with physicist Paul Langevin. However, in 1911, she won her second Nobel Prize, this time in Chemistry, becoming the first person to receive two.

Her discoveries transformed medicine and physics, leading to advancements in cancer treatment and nuclear science. She died on July 4, 1934, from radiation exposure, leaving a lasting legacy for women in science.





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HERTHA AYRTON

Hertha Ayrton (born Phoebe Sarah Marks on April 28, 1854, in Portsea, England) was a pioneering engineer, mathematician, physicist, and inventor. The daughter of Polish-Jewish immigrants, she showed an early aptitude for science and mathematics. She attended Girton College, Cambridge, where she studied mathematics. Although Cambridge did not award degrees to women at the time, she passed the Mathematical Tripos exams in 1880.

After completing her education, she worked as a teacher while patenting her first invention, a line-divider, used in technical drawing. She later married physicist William Ayrton, who supported her scientific pursuits. Hertha Ayrton's most notable work focused on electric arcs, widely used for street lighting. She identified the causes of flickering and hissing in electric arcs and presented her findings to the Institution of Electrical Engineers (IEE) in 1899. She became the first woman admitted as a member of the IEE in 1902.

Her research extended to fluid dynamics, particularly on the formation of sand ripples and the behavior of air vortices. During World War I, she developed the Ayrton fan, designed to dispel poison gas from trenches. Despite her accomplishments, she faced institutional sexism, including being denied membership in the Royal Society.

A passionate advocate for women's rights, Ayrton was active in the suffrage movement. She died on August 26, 1923, leaving a legacy of groundbreaking contributions to science and engineering, paving the way for future women in STEM fields.



ELEMENTS OF THE HALF-LIFE OF MARIE CURIE

FRENCH ACADEMY OF SCIENCES: A learned society, founded in 1666 by Louis XIV to encourage and protect the spirit of French scientific research.

HALF-LIFE: The time required for a quantity to reduce to half of its initial value. The term is used generally to characterize any type of exponential decay.

NOBEL PRIZE: 6 separate prizes—Physics, Chemistry, Physiology or Medicine, Literature, Economic Sciences, and Peace—annually awarded to those who, during the preceding year, have conferred the greatest benefit to humankind. The Nobel Prizes are widely regarded as the most prestigious awards available in their respective fields.

ODE: A lyric poem in the form of an address to express the writer's feelings on a particular subject.

POLONIUM: A rare, radioactive metal found in nature, but usually made in laboratories.

RADIATION: Radiation is the release of energy in the form of invisible waves or tiny fast-moving particles. Some types, like high-energy radiation, can remove electrons from atoms, which can change or damage materials.

RADIUM: The chemical element and rare radioactive metal of alkaline earth series. It was formerly used as a source of radiation for radiotherapy.

RADIUM INSTITUTE: Under Marie Curie's direction, the Radium Institute in Paris became a world center for the study of radioactivity.

SUFFRAGETTE: A woman advocating for the right to vote.

QUESTION CORNER

Consider the following questions sometime after the performance—whether it's enjoying a meal in town or on your drive home:

- What are unforgettable moments, images, or lines from the play?

OH, THOSE ODES!

If you read the script of *The Half-Life of Marie Curie*, you'll notice Lauren Gunderson labels some sections as odes (e.g. "Hertha's ode to the electric arc." and "Marie's ode to the radium in her pocket.")

WHAT IS AN ODE?

"A formal, often ceremonious lyric poem that addresses and often celebrates a person, place, thing, or idea." —The Poetry Foundation

An ode's structure can vary. Early forms had a strict stanza/rhyming structure. The odes of the English Romantic poets vary in stanza form. They often address an intense emotion at the onset of a personal crisis or celebrate an object or image that leads to revelation. (Both of which ring true in *The Half-Life of Marie Curie.*)

WRITE YOUR OWN ODE

- Pick something or someone to celebrate.
- Will it be free verse, or something more structured (with stanzas and rhymes)?
- Make a copy and share it with us—perhaps we'll even display it in our lobby or on social media!
